OPA Dinner Meeting sponsor for June was OklaHome!

Speaker: Lt Col. David McCollum - Civil Air Patrol

Lt Col. David McCollum currently serves as Oklahoma Wing Chief of Staff and Government Relations Advisor. McCollum joined Civil Air Patrol in 2008 while living in Texas, fulfilling a long-time interest in the organization. His impetus for finally joining the all-volunteer auxiliary of the U.S. Air Force was the highly publicized search for Steve Fossett, which CAP was heavily involved in.

McCollum served Texas Wing in various capacities, including unit, group and wing public affairs officer, and unit deputy commander for seniors, all while becoming a qualified search and rescue mission pilot. After transferring to Oklahoma Wing in 2014, McCollum served as wing public affairs officer, wing director of emergency services, and commanded the Oklahoma City Composite Squadron. Under his leadership, the unit lost fewer members



during the COVID-19 pandemic than any other unit in Oklahoma Wing (less than 14 percent when the wing and national average was in the 20+ percent range).

He graduated from Southwest Region Staff College at Kirtland AFB in 2017 and was named outstanding student. McCollum graduated from CAP's National Staff College at Maxwell AFB in 2019.

McCollum is a senior mission pilot with more than 2,000 hours of flight time, mission check pilot, senior incident commander and holds numerous other emergency services qualifications. He holds master ratings in public affairs and emergency services, with senior ratings in operations and several other specialty tracks. He is an instructor for CAP's Volunteer University, the organization's professional development schoolhouse.

He is a graduate of the University of Oklahoma and currently resides in Oklahoma City.

The June OPA Fly Away will be to Chickasha on June 3,2023. New members Grant and Rebecca Aguirre, from Guthrie, have a 2000 Cessna 182. Jim & Vickie Yates, long time OPA members, celebrated their 59th wedding anniversary at the

OPA meeting. Mike Grimes presented the slate of officers for re-election. Brian Hancock will replace Chris Call, and David Wilson will replace Bill Hines. Eric Lang, Mike Rangel, Joey Sager, and Jeff Sandusky will stay on the board. All current officers will remain in their positions. The election was declared by acclimation of members present. (Note from your editor: Thanks to all of our OPA Officers and Board Members for their service and all the time they spend working for our organization. It is a lot of work, and they do a fantastic job!)

Lee Holmes introduced the speaker, Dr. Jeffrey Underwood, and his wife. From 1999 to 2016, you might have seen him on one of his numerous TV appearances as the historian for the National Museum of the US Air Force. He has also written many books and articles for professional journals and magazines. He has a wealth of entertaining historical information.


He spoke about presidential airlifts. Airpower is a presidential mission. Presidents didn't fly until the 1930s.

Before that everyone thought planes were too dangerous. The first President to fly in an airplane was FD Roosevelt. When he was running for re-election, he flew in 1932 to a Democratic Party Convention. Two Presidents flew before they were elected. Hap Arnold proposed an airplane for President Roosevelt. It was a YC 30 Condor, and they had to make a lift for him to enter the airplane. He flew again in a 314 Dixie Clipper to an overseas conference (US Navy). Hap Arnold decided the Army should be flying the President, not the Navy. In 1945, he commanded that a C54 Bomber be converted for a Presidential aircraft to include a lift chair that descended below the aircraft to pick up FDR. The Secret Service said the converted aircraft was not safe enough, so Hap

Arnold told Douglas to build a special aircraft to fly the President. It was designated a Douglas YC-54 and was named the Sacred Cow. The crew designed a Sacred Cow Patch to be worn on their flight jackets. The aircraft is still at the National Museum of the Air Force.







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Harry Truman loved to fly and flew extensively. 1947 Douglas Aircraft VC118 replaced the older plane. Hairy Truman flew in the Douglas and later flew in a Douglas VC-118 (The Independence) to Wake Island in 1947.

Lockheed built the first "AirForce One" in 1952 for President Eisenhower. Lockheed-VC121A - "Columbine III", and later Lockheed VC121E - "Columbine III" (1954). It was named the Independence. In 1956 Aero Commander was accepted as the only twin-engine aircraft to be used for transport of a President. (Aero Commander was built in OKC and flown to Washington DC on a single engine to show how safe it was.) In 1957 they used a helicopter, Bell UH-13J to transport the President.

In 1959 it was a Boeing VC137B. In 1962 President Kennedy used a Boeing VC137C, the first Presidential jet aircraft. Raymond Loewy & Jackie Kennedy designed the paint scheme for the Presidential aircraft. In 1972 it was a Boeing

VC137B. It was the second jet aircraft used for a President and two of them were built. This was the same aircraft in which President Kennedy was transported back to DC after he was assassinated in Dallas. Also, President Johnson was standing in that aircraft when he was sworn in as the new President in Dallas. That aircraft was retired in 1990 and is now in a museum.



In 1990 the Boeing VC-25A-SAM 280000 and 290000 (747 variants) were put into service. The future Presidential Jet is currently under construction by Boeing with flex composite wings and a new General Electric GEnx-2B engine.

It will fly to Hong Kong from Washington DC without refueling. It is six stories tall and is faster. The design has been modified to help reduce the cost. Estimated cost is \$5.3 billion for 2 mission ready 747-8l aircraft. Our thanks to Dr. Underwood for a very interesting presentation.

Born in Germany, my life had a rather unorthodox beginning. I moved to the States when I was two and began a life of


